

MSCA Key Terms: 1. Participating Organisations

Beneficiary

- Legal entity that signs the grant agreement, receives funding, claims costs.
- Have responsibility for the implementation of the action.

Coordinator

 The beneficiary in the consortium who is the central contact point of the project. They are responsible for the submission of the ITN proposal and overall coordination and successful delivery of the project.

Partner Organisation

- Does not sign the grant agreement and cannot directly claim costs.
- Contributes to the implementation of the action.





MSCA Key Terms: 2. Types of Sectors

Academic

- Public or private higher education establishments awarding academic degrees.
- Public or private non-profit research institutes whose primary mission is to pursue research.

Non-academic

• Socio-economic actors not included in the academic sector e.g. industry, government, charitable organisations, cultural institutions, hospitals, international organisations etc.







- Complement the ITN through providing additional research & transferable skills and/or secondment opportunities.
- Partner organisations can be established anywhere in the world.

Definitions for ITNs

Early-stage researchers (ESRs)

Less than 4 years research experience (from the date they obtained the degree entitling them to embark on a doctorate) and have not been awarded a doctoral degree.

Mobility rule for early stage researchers

The ESRs must not have lived or carried out their main work/studies in the country of the recruiting beneficiary for more than **12 months in the 3 years** before the recruitment date.


Secondment in ITNs

A secondment is **research training which takes place at a different beneficiary or partner organisation**. The duration of a secondment is limited to a maximum of 30% of the research training.












Typical Size of a European Training Network

- A typical ETN contains
 6-10 beneficiaries
 recruiting 10-15 ESRs
 for 36 months.
- The number of POs varies depending on the project.
- For example, each beneficiary may include a secondment PO for each ESR recruited.









European Industrial Doctorate: Minimum Requirements

Consortium Composition:


- 2 beneficiaries from 2 different MS/AC
- 1 doctoral awarding institution
- 1 non-academic institution

PhD Requirement:

Each ESR receives a doctorate

Intersectoral:

- Must spend at least 50% of time in non-academic sector
- Additional beneficiaries and partner organisations: More beneficiaries can be added from MS, AC or TC eligible for funding. Partner organisations can be established anywhere in the world.







European Joint Doctorate: Minimum Requirements

Consortium Composition:


- 3 beneficiaries from 3 different MS/AC
- 3 doctoral degree awarding organisations.

PhD Requirement:

- Two-thirds of ESRs complete a joint/double doctorate.
- The ESRs will need to spend the time in each beneficiary required to receive a doctoral degree.

Additional beneficiaries and partner organisations

 More beneficiaries can be added from MS, AC or TC eligible for funding. Partner organisations can be established anywhere in the world.

- The EU contribution under the Marie Skłodowska-Curie actions is based on unit costs expressed in person-months.
- The country coefficient applies to the living allowance. This coefficient is the one applicable to the country of the beneficiary, as listed in Table 2 in the MSCA work programme.

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

ITN Cross-Cutting Issues

Gender

- Gender balance should be evident in management structure and supervision and amongst the recruited ESRs
- How gender can affect the research work or dissemination/communication activities

Open Science

- Open access to research publications
- Management of research data (DMP)
- Open publication of research data (where appropriate)

Communication & Dissemination

- Communication is not the same as Dissemination
- Dissemination is towards potential users (research peers, industry, policymakers)
- Communication is to multiple audiences, including the media and the public

Responsible Research and Innovation

- Adhering to ethics rules
- Ensuring that the research is performed with integrity avoiding fabrication, falsification and plagiarism

Sustainable Development and Climate Action

• As a large portion of the H2020 budget will address these themes, refer to them if appropriate

FAQ of ITN TC Involvement

Innovative Training Networks (ITN) FAQ

Are beneficiaries from countries with a bilateral S&T agreement with the EU eligible for funding in an ITN?

 In case an ITN wishes to have a third country beneficiary from one of the countries with an S&T Agreement with the EU, they should ensure a very convincing description of the contribution in the proposal. Here are all countries with bilateral S&T Agreements listed, e.g. the US, Australia, Japan, China, India etc.

Can organisations located in third countries participate in ITNs?

- Organisation located in Third countries can participate as beneficiaries if they are eligible for funding (see slide 17)
- If they are not eligible Third country organisations can always participate as partner organisations







Applying to Existing ITNs

There are a number of existing fully funded ITNs running that cover a variety of research areas!

Who can be recruited into a running ITN?

Early stage researchers from anywhere in the world as long as they meet the mobility rule (slide 18). ESRs may, in agreement with the supervisor and beneficiary implement their project on a part-time basis

What does it mean if I am recruited into an ITN?

Undertake **research project** with an **international network** of academic and non-academic organisations and receive **state of the art research skills** and **transferable skills** throughout the duration of the programme (typically 36 months).

What ITNs are recruiting ESRs?

All ITN vacancies are published on <u>EURAXESS Jobs and</u> <u>Funding Portal</u>

MSCA RISE: How it works

Organisations from the academic and non-academic sectors, based in Europe (EU Member States and Associated Countries) and outside Europe (third countries) **RISE Structure** Implemented through staff secondments

Develop a joint research project between organisations

Increase transfer of knowledge

Organise training events/workshops/seminars with network to complement secondments



RISE Secondments: Goal

RISE secondments are sending staff members to other participating organisations to achieve two short-term goals of the RISE action





Goal 1.

Staff members perform tasks to achieve the objectives of the proposed R&I action

Goal 2.

Staff members develop new R&I and transferable skills to boost future career opportunities through the RISE action and connected networking activities





RISE Secondments

Staff Members Eligible for a Secondment

- Early-stage researchers (less than 4 years research experience and no PhD)
- Experienced researchers (more than 4 years research experience or have a PhD)
- Administrative, managerial, technical staff supporting the R&I activities of the action.





RISE Secondments

Secondment Duration

Duration per staff member:

- Maximum 12 months
- Minimum of 1 month

Funding is provided to project per secondmentmonth of each staff member

A maximum of 540 PM of EU funded secondments per action.





RISE Funding Model

- The budget is calculated automatically by calculating the secondment Person-Month(s) (PM) by staff members.
- The RISE funding is allocated to the **coordinator** who distributes the contribution to each **beneficiary** according to their secondment person-Month(s) (PM) by staff members to other participating organisations.







RISE: Can a Third Country not listed in Annex A of the WP participate in RISE?

Yes. However, the secondments **from TC** are not funded unless the participation of the TC is deemed essential for carrying out the action (see slide 11, 21, 22)

How does financing of those organisations in TC who are eligible for funding work?

The coordinator distributes the contribution for secondments from TC partners to its organisation. For the sending organisation established in MS/AC, the EU contribution can be transferred to the TC. It is highly encouraged to define these financial arrangements in a partnership agreement to determine clear and transparent rules governing the internal relations between MS/AC beneficiaries and TC partner organisations

Can Third countries not eligible for funding secondments from TC receive a percentage of the institutional cost (research and management)?

No. The beneficiaries must co-finance the action by supporting the costs not reimbursed by the EU (in that case, the secondments from TC not eligible for funding). However, institutional costs can be used to cover general networking (where partners from TC not eligible for funding are also involved).




